CLOUD DANCE SONGS OF SAN JUAN PUEBLO

At the beginning of each year in San Juan Pueblo a dance is performed for the newly elected pueblo officials. Traditionally it is the cloud dance. Six new songs must be composed each year. Sometimes an old tune or rhythm might be used, but the words are newly composed. Six cloud dance songs sung by Joe M. Abeyeta, Cipriano Garcia, Jerry Garcia, Peter Garcia, Carpio Trujillo and John R. DEER DANCE SONGS OF SAN JUAN PUEBLO

The San Juan Deer Dance, called paa-share in Tewa, is performed each year in mid February. It begins in the late afternoon on the eve of the dance. With the exception of the Ange'in, all of the songs are very old and sung every year. The Ange'in in this recording was newly composed for the deer dance in 1979 by Cipriano Garcia. The four early morning songs are unique in that fourteen different animals are mentioned in the Apache language during each song. For this recording the first seven are sung in the first and third songs, with the second seven being sung in the second and fourth songs. There are four daytime songs. The first three were shortened to three parts. The fourth was sung with all five sections. The running away song is also sung with all five sections. We are very happy to present these beautiful deer dance songs of San Juan Pueblo.

Volume 1 in the Hopi Language Series spoken by Tawahongsi. This is the Hopi alphabet. These letters or letter characters are the marks used to write the Hopi language. And like any alphabet, the letters represent the sounds of speech in the Hopi language. This audio recording and booklet teach the Hopi language by introducing the 21 symbols that make up the Hopi alphabet. Starting with the vowels, each symbol is pronounced and example words are given to allow the listener to hear the pronunciation. After going through the 21 symbols, common Hopi phrases are introduced and pronounced in Hopi as well. The listener learns not only the symbols that make up *Hopilavayvenpi*, they also learn words and phrases.

ROUND DANCE SONGS OF THE TAOS PUEBLO

Round dance is a social dance which has long been popular among many Plains tribes as well as at Taos Pueblo. It has also become popular among numerous intertribal clubs in cities where many Indians have relocated. Taos Pueblo is unique in that for more than a century its singers and composers have been successfully performing and composing in this Plains musical form in addition to their own Pueblo forms. Today Taos is widely recognized as a center for excellent round dance singing and composition. In these recordings, the goal was

to present Taos round dance singing as it would be sung at an actual dance. Reissued on CD.

ALPH SECAKUKU

Alph Secakuku is a composer and artist from the Hopi Tribe in northern Arizona. He is also a noted lecturer and author of various topics concerning the Hopi. Alph also performs in concert with Native American flute player John Hulling.

- **SONGS OF THE FOURTH WORLD**

In one of the most remote areas of northern Arizona lies the land of the Hopi. These lands are relatively barren and very dry, having an annual rainfall of only five to seven inches. Even so, the Hopi, known as the "Peaceful People" are very grateful to their supreme deity for entrusting this sacred earth to them. Being assigned as caretakers of Mother Earth, the Hopi regard these high desert mesas to be the "Spiritual Center of the Universe"... also known as the Fourth World. ZUNI**- TRADITIONAL SONGS FROM THE ZUNI PUEBLO**

The Zuni people are a Pueblo tribe that settled in the desert of the American southwest more than 2000 years ago. The beautiful songs and ornate dances that accompany their ceremonies celebrate the planting and harvesting of crops and offer prayers for rain and a successful hunt. These historic recordings give a glimpse in to the life and tradition of an ancient people. Tracks 1-4 were recorded in 1953 and originally released as 78RPM's (ARP-156a/b and ARP-157a/b). Tracks 5-13 were recorded in 1968 and originally released as the LP and cassette *ZUNI* (6060). Tracks 14-23 were recorded in 1971 and originally released as the LP *SUMMER SONGS FROM ZUNI* (6077).
